Did you know there are more Pride events than just the <u>Indy Pride Parade</u> and <u>Festival</u> June 10? Indy Pride, Inc. hosts several events throughout the month of June, including:

Observances & Celebrations

Juneteenth – June 19

Juneteenth is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. This celebration honors the day in 1865 when slaves in Texas and Louisiana finally heard they were free, two months after the end of the Civil War and two and a half years after Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation.

The observance of June 19th as the African American Emancipation Day has spread across the United States and is now a federal holiday commemorating African American freedom – emphasizing education and achievement. <u>Learn more</u>.

Pride Month - June

Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer (LGBTQ+) Pride Month is currently celebrated each year in the month of June to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan. The Stonewall Uprising was a tipping point for the Gay Liberation Movement in the United States. The purpose of the commemorative month is to recognize the impact that LGBTQ+ individuals have had on history locally, nationally, and internationally. <u>Learn more</u>.

Caribbean American Heritage Month - June

Caribbean American Heritage Month was established to create and disseminate knowledge about the contributions of Caribbean immigrants to the United States and their descendants. Some of the most notable Caribbean Americans include Alexander Hamilton, first Secretary of the Treasury; Colin Powell, the first person of color appointed as the Secretary of State; James Weldon Johnson, the writer of the Black National Anthem; Celia Cruz, the world-renowned "Queen of Salsa" music; and Shirley Chisholm, the first black Congresswoman and first black woman candidate for President. <u>Learn more</u>.


Education




Eiteljorg Indian Market & Festival

Emily Reflects on Attending the ABIDE *How the Other Half Eats* Discussion

Emily attended because she wanted to learn more about how food and socioeconomic status are connected, and what that might mean for Second Helpings. Here are her thoughts:

"I was so glad that this conversation started with a video to start from the same point, since I hadn't read/listened to anything ahead of time. This made me feel not totally behind, and I could still participate in the conversation. I learned that "food deserts" are not a critical piece of the problem. They exist, but aren't a major contributing factor to food insecurity, as I thought. Leaving our meeting made me want to read the book even more!"
