

#### The Care and Feeding of the ABIDE-brary By: Caitlin Bartnik, Hunger Relief Manager

Books are a magical portal into someone else's experiences and life story. Reading a good book is both enjoyable and often educational. To mix good books and good people, and to improve <u>Access, Belonging, Inclusion, Diversity, and Equity at Second Helpings, the ABIDE library has been created.</u>

The ABIDE library, or the ABIDE-brary, if you will, exists for the Second Helpings community. This includes staff, volunteers, students, and visiting partners. No one is excluded from library use, but it will be geared towards staff and volunteers. Keep reading so you know how to check books out, then go find your next book to read.

The ABIDE-brary will soon be registered as a Little Free Library to gain access to resources such as free book raffles and will be listed as part of the Little Free Library network. The ABIDE-brary will operate on the Little Free Library model of "take a book, share a book" on the honor system. To check out a book, peruse the shelves for a book that would bring value to you or a loved one. Remove your selection from the shelf and take it home. Or read it here! When you are done with the book, share it with someone else or bring it back to re-share from here. Sharing books with others is encouraged. Recommended, even.

The ABIDE-brary will move to the Dining Room once the volunteer breakroom construction is complete; for the time being, it's currently located between Julie and Claire's offices in Podville. To donate a book to the ABIDE-brary, just put the book in the donation basket on the library shelf. Caitlin will sort and shelve the books.

Reading books is fun, but the fun doesn't have to end there. Keep an eye out this summer for interactive activities associated with the library such as a place to recommend your favorite books, discuss genres, highlight quotes you loved, and other ways to share your book experience.

What are you waiting for? The ABIDE-brary is open and books are waiting to be read!

## Education



## The Groundwater Approach Presented by the Racial Equity Institute Thursday, June 8 | 9:00 AM – 12:00 PM

Join us for the Groundwater Approach, a virtual session rooted in addressing systems and equity. When The Indianapolis Foundation announced its new mission in 2016, it committed to a journey of expanding an understanding of the impact systemic racism has on Marion County communities.

In this virtual webinar, REI organizers will use stories and data to present a perspective that racism is fundamentally structural in nature. The Groundwater metaphor is designed to help people at all levels internalize the reality that we live in a racially structured society using three key truths:

- racial inequity looks the same across systems
- socio-economic difference does not explain the racial inequity
- inequities are caused by systems, regardless of people's culture or behavior.

## Keion Shares his Considerations for the New ABIDE Logo

I wanted to create a visual identity for the ABIDE committee. This logo communicates ABIDE's mission, and their acronym, through four elements of visual design: color, form, iconography, and typography.

<u>Color</u>: Looking through the lens of inclusivity, and in efforts to stay within Second Helpings' brand guidelines, I chose to use the color purple. This purple is high in contrast with white, to be mindful of a varied ability to see – especially considering those with low vision or other visual impairments.

**Form:** The structure of the logo represents a badge, or pin. This is to convey a sort of officiality. Abide means "to be able to tolerate and act in accordance with," and I feel that a badge form is a great way to communicate that.

**Iconography:** To make ABIDE's mission a reality, it takes a multitude of people to be involved. Hands are included to communicate an "all hands-on deck" mentality.

**Typography:** I used the typeface Sabon for this logo. Sabon is a serif typeface, meaning it has extra lines that shoot from the ends of the letters. Serif typefaces tend to look more professional and authoritative compared to other typefaces, which also helps the logo convey a sense of officiality.



Through these elements, I aimed to create a logo that not only communicates what ABIDE is, but also would be on par with the fantastic work that will sprout from this committee.
