## **Observances & Celebrations**

#### Women's History Month (March)

<u>Women's History Month</u> is a celebration of women's contributions to US history, culture and society and has been observed annually in the month of March in the United States since 1987. The <u>National Women's History Alliance</u> designates a yearly theme for Women's History Month. The 2024 theme celebrates "Women Who Advocate for Equity, Diversity and Inclusion." This theme recognizes women who understand the need to eliminate bias and discrimination from individuals' lives and institutions.

<u>International Women's Day</u> (March 8) – A global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural, and political achievements of women. The day also marks a call to action for accelerating gender parity. Significant activity is witnessed worldwide as groups come together to celebrate women's achievements or rally for women's equality.

#### **Developmental Disability Awareness Month (March)**

National Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month is a nationwide event to raise awareness about the inclusion of people with developmental disabilities and address the barriers that those with disabilities face. Inclusion is necessary since about 15% of the world's population lives with a disability. Developmental Disability Awareness Month is about understanding the relationship between the way people function and how they participate in society and making sure everybody has the same opportunities in every aspect of life to the best of their abilities. #### **Autism Acceptance Month (April)**

Autism Acceptance Month raises awareness to promote autism acceptance, to celebrate each individual's unique differences, and to foster inclusivity and connectedness. The theme, "Celebrate Differences," will be running for its 5th year.

World Autism Awareness Day (April 2) – Raises global awareness and promotes advocacy related to all aspects of autism spectrum disorder.




## OPTIONAL Staff Conversation: Learning About the History of Disability Rights with Judy Heumann

# How I Used My DEI Experience Funds By: Anne King, Culinary Job Training Employment Specialist

I went to *The Folks at Home* - a comedy/play at the IRT about a gay biracial couple and their family. It opens a window into the lives of people from different backgrounds struggling financially and personally, who have a willingness to find their common ground and be open to the love of a family, despite their differences.

What did I learn? - I could relate to the expectations we have for ourselves and our loved ones; having a home, family, work and how we identify through that. It also shed light on family and how different we can be from each other with our views of race and class. There are some uncomfortable scenes where characters make racially insensitive remarks/slurs which are intended to make a point but left me feeling uncomfortable to laugh. However, bringing laughter into the room was in some ways even more impactful.
